TIPS FOR IMPROVING YOUR CHANGE READINESS



Build Trust

Establish open communication and make sure staff feel heard and valued for their part in the change process.



Communicate Clearly

Share the purpose, benefits, and steps of the change with your team to build trust and understanding.



Involve your Team

Encourage staff input and participation to foster a sense of ownership among the whole team.



Provide Training

Provide professional development opportunities to make sure your staff have the tools needed for success.



Start Small

If you can, pilot changes on a smaller scale before rolling them out program-wide. For example, maybe make the change in one classroom to help you work out the challenges that arise and then implement the change program-wide.



Practice Caring Transparency

Share the 'why' behind the change and keep everyone informed throughout the process. Tailor your message to your audience to make sure they have enough information, but also that you do not cause staff to become overwhelmed. Share with staff what they need to know in their specific role.



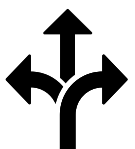
Celebrate Wins

Recognize both small and large milestones and successes along the way to maintain motivation and support a positive work culture.



Evaluate & Reflect

Assess the change process while implementing and after it is implemented to identify course corrections along the way and areas for future improvement.



Be Flexible

Stay open to adjustments as challenges or feedback arise. Model a calm, problem-solving approach to your team.
